1. **Call to Order:** Robin Greenberg, President, called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m.
2. **Roll Call:** Robert Ringler, Secretary, called the roll with 21 present & two alternates, Desiree and Stephanie, standing in for André & Matt Friedman, for a total of 23 present; 8 absent; quorum met.
3. **Pledge of Allegiance**
4. **Approval of Minutes: September 28, 2016 (Attachment "A") & August 7, 2016 (Attachment "B")**
Copies of Minutes (Attachments "A" & "B") have been circulated with the draft agenda.
September 28, 2016 Minutes: Cathy Wayne moved; seconded by Leslie Weisberg; Larry asked to remove Paul Edelman's comment regarding the \$24 parcel tax coming to a halt. Vote was taken with 20 yes; 0 no, 1 abstention Maureen Levinson, and were **approved as amended**.

August 7, 2016 Minutes: Moved by Larry Leisten; seconded by Chuck Maginnis. Larry related that he gave comments to Cathy in response to the original August minutes, (reflected in this evening's version #2 of the August minutes.) He recommended removal of "too detailed information as to what Ivan said," and removal of Ivan's comments RE: noticing PLUC meeting with Joint Board meeting. Additionally, Larry corrected the wording that five-year term limits apply to Board officers, not members. The minutes were **approved as amended**.

5. **Public Comment:** Dr. Pamela Pierson expressed an interest in our Public Works/Telecommunications Committee. Larry noted we had a Telecommunications Infrastructure Committee 10 years ago; interest dropped, it was discontinued, but may be formed again if issues arise. Dr. Pierson gave a positive report on the October 1st 14430 Mulholland party-house sting operation, with the presence of many Police vehicles and officers, sponsored by Lieutenant Day. As to the illegal gas line on her property, the Bureau of Engineering may have the Gas Company remove and install it in a safe fashion on owner's property at 14430. She produced a map showing the properties, and noted that she continues to seek guidance.

Reports of Officers

6. **President's Report** – Robin Greenberg

- a. **Special Presentation on the Stone Canyon Reservoir Project** – Jason Stinnett, DWP
Mr. Stinnett introduced himself, Ms. Susan Rowghani, Project Manager, Mr. Ruben Rosales, and Ms. Julie Van Wagner. He announced that they do an Owens Valley Tour annually. A Power Point presentation was given on the planned Stone Canyon Reservoir Project.

Ms. Rowghani related that the project's benefits are to protect water quality, enhance water storage reliability and improve area fire protection. Mr. Rosales explained they will install floating cover and appurtenances and make modifications to the inlet and outlet structures. Once contractors are selected, they'll introduce the team. They will install submersible valves, build a structure to house the valves; there is a chlorination station; they will do a full reconstruction of the road on the east; have identified a landslide on the east and will do landslide remediation.

They are removing 59 trees and will replace them at a 2:1 ratio; will plant 107 trees; will have two Fire Dept. helicopter pads; put in hydro-seeded cross-gutters for landslide remediation. He described reduction of 9,000 cubic yards to 3,200; haul trucks trips from 1800 to 600; imported material 22,000 to 7,200; truck trips 34 to 7. They drain reservoir on July 17th; do construction July to April 2019; landslide work September 2017 to April 2019; anticipate construction for 24 months; estimated cost of 36 million dollars. Main objective is to cover the reservoir. They'll modify the intake at the north; there will be traffic person there to maintain safety.

The contractors will have to obtain haul routes through BOE. They expect to take the simplest route from 405 to Mulholland. They have not put constraints on the types of trucks but suspect they'd go with smaller trucks. They'll have security guards onsite. They will be re-routing water on the west side to a diversion structure, and put through a bypass line. They will replace Black Walnut, Western Sycamore and Live Oak trees. Leslie asked them to consider the tree blights, especially of the Sycamores. They are working closely with their Council offices and will reach out to the schools. They'll return in February/March with the contractor.

- b. **Representatives of Elected Officials and Agencies** (Updates & Discussions)

- i. Jeff Prang, L.A., County Assessor gave update. 213-974-3101

Mr. Prang is not the tax collector but works with the tax collector's and controller's offices. There are five departments involved in property taxes (tax collector is next door). His is not a revenue department; they do real estate appraisal to establish the value. <http://assessor.lacounty.gov/meet-the-assessor/>

In July, with the Board of Supervisors, they passed raising the threshold for reporting business personal property tax from \$2,000 to \$5,000, which had the effect of removing 50,000 small businesses off the property tax roll, and saving money for the County. They raised the homeowners' exemption, taking \$7,000 off property assessment for tax purposes. Check it out, file online and let the public know. <http://assessor.lacounty.gov/message-to-homeowners/> With Senator Ben Allen, they introduced legislation, but were not successful, SB 434, to close a loophole in property assessment that allows a multi-million dollar structure built upon a mobile home chassis to be classified as a vehicle to avoid property taxes. Robin and the Board thanked him.

ii. Catherine Landers Field Deputy for CD-4 CM David Ryu - Not present

iii. Julia Duncan, Senior Planning Deputy for CD-4 CM David Ryu – Julia noted that Catherine Landers sends her regards. She thanked us and noted that condolences have been passed on to Councilman Ryu, whose father passed away last week. CM Ryu was in Korea with his family.

Update from Julia included that the party-house legislation easily cleared Public Safety, heads to City Council and will probably go on consent with no further public comment in City Council. After approval, they'll draft an ordinance, which will be reviewed, which will take about four to five months. She noted that yesterday, at the PLUM at City Council, modifications were achieved on the 8150 Sunset project to include: a 56-foot height reduction down to from 234 feet tall down to 178 feet; 249 units proposed reduced to 229; keep total number of affordable and work force units at the original number; sidewalks increased by an additional 3 feet, in compliance with Mobility 2035; \$2,000,000 in traffic mitigations; a 10-foot setback affecting neighbors on Havenhurst and neighbors to the west, and getting the City of West Hollywood to come to an agreement with the developers. Julia concluded that they were very happy with the outcome and the work that CM Ryu put into this.

Jamie Hall noted that the Laurel Canyon Association was one of the five appellants; they settled with the developer yesterday, who agreed to establish a significant community benefit fund which will go toward funding improvements in the LC community, e.g., sidewalks, bus stops, traffic control officers, emergency evacuation plan. Jamie thanked CM Ryu's office for their efforts and making this possible.

Julia explained that the Lytton Bank will be considered for historical cultural designation on 11/22, which the Councilman supports; as prescribed through the EIR already completed as part of the original project's EIR. They are working with the L.A. Conservancy on this.

Robin and the Board expressed appreciation to Jamie Hall.

iv. Gurmet Khara, Valley Field Deputy for CD-5 CM Paul Koretz – Gurmet thanked CM Ryu for the party-house ordinance that passed today, which will help LAPD, B&S and LAFD with this. She noted the party house at 14430 Mulholland Drive was shut down a few weekends ago, as mentioned by Dr. Pierson, from the help of the residents who notified the City. She relies on us to be their eyes and ears. There was another in Benedict Canyon on Antelo, and with a week's notice that they were able to come out. She gave credit to Chris Ragsdale, who was there.

On November 30, Vince Bertoni with Paul Koretz will be at the Encino Community Center.

As to the construction worker's death at 908 Bel Air Road, Gurmet noted that Paul Koretz has asked the LAFD and B&S to find out what occurred and to make sure that the contractors are following all rules and regulations. She expects to have more information at our next meeting.

Gurmet related that the resurfacing at Mulholland, Nicada and Beverly Glen on last year's proposed list is on hold with Bureau of Engineering. The gas leak at Pamela Pierson's has been repaired but they

won't resurface until safety issues are mitigated, including the gas line in front of Dr. Pierson's home which should be in front of the 14430 Mulholland party house next door. The street is on this year's list.

Bob Schlesinger asked about trucks that will be brought in by DWP. Gurmet noted that the DWP had a meeting with some board members, and addressed some concerns including hours of operation; they determined that no residential streets or canyon streets can be used. CM Koretz asked DWP to have meetings with some of the Board members every month or three months. She will be our point person with the Department. They have asked the DWP if start time is 7:00 that all trucks are there before 7:00.

As to the section of Mulholland between Nicada and Beverly Glen, Larry Leisten what is the timing required as to relocation of the gas line. Gurmet has been working with the Gas Co. & BOE to relocate the gas line if it is in an improper spot. She noted that there is a one-year moratorium after resurfacing, where no utility company can come in and cut through the street.

Maureen Levinson asked, regarding the death at 908 Bel Air Road, if Cal-OSHA comes out to every site as several sites don't have a licensed general contractor on projects 20,000 square feet and more. Gurmet will inquire of Faisal if they come out and about access to Cal-OSHA's records.

v. Faisal Alserri, Senior Planning Deputy for CD-5 CM Paul Koretz – Not present

vi. Janet Turner, Representative for 33rd District Congressman – Not present

vii. Chris Ragsdale, Senior Lead Officer, LAPD, WLA Station 26690@lapd.lacity.org Chris related that crime is down from 10 to 7; GTAs are biggest hit, but also car break-ins; especially in hillside, with cars in exposed driveways and street, with unlocked doors. They have undercover teams that track this, and based on that information will send resources. He encouraged use of security technologies. He noted the ongoing issue of party houses, coinciding with short-term rentals. He gave thanks to the community, especially BCA, who has been giving them a lot of information. He noted that if you have information on a party house, a chronic location, give them as much info as possible, and they'll try to work with it. Some enforcement falls on B&S. Feel free to email or call him. If it's a crime in progress whether it just occurred or is about to occur, always dial 911; however, if you have information, and don't know who to report it to, report it at www.crimestoppersla.com or call.

Matt Post noted the party house on Davies, and asked why not cite every time as the Neighborhood Prosecutor has said they can't do anything if a citation was not written. Chris noted they are working on something to make this more consistent. Desirée from Bel Air Ridge commended Chris for preventing the last party, and noted that they had one point person, Ms. Amar, who outreached to the community and Chris, and were able to prevent a possible death or fire. She thanked Chris and commended the citizen who spearheaded this. Chris noted it is key that the community works with the police.

Dan Love asked Chris in regards to bad-actor construction companies, if he could visit the speculators/developers. Chris noted that this could be coordinated with him or Ralph Sanchez, Faisal and CD5. They are setting up a meeting with B&S, the CD office, and a rep of LAPD to address neighbor-to-neighbor construction issues. Skip Haynes added that there was a brazen theft of his wife's property.

10. Planning & Land Use Committee – Update on 10/13/2016 Meeting - Bob Schlesinger

a. The PLUC recommends approval of the following actions from the 10/13/2016 meeting:

i. 9030 Meredith Place DIR-2016-2372

The BABCNC Planning & Land Use Committee, in a vote of 8 yes, 0 no, and 0 abstentions, recommended to **approve** the project as presented.

Motion To approve the project was moved by Robert Schlesinger; none opposed; two abstentions, and the **motion to approve passed**.

ii. 14380 Mulholland Dr. 90077 DIR-2016-2138-DRB-SPP-MSP Hearing: 8/18/16 (ZA Conditional Approval, will update the Commission)

The BABCNC Planning & Land Use Committee, in a vote of 8 yes, 0 no, and 0 abstentions, recommended to **approve** the project as presented.

Motion: To approve the project was moved by Robert Schlesinger; none opposed; 3 abstained; **motion to approve passed.**

iii. 8333 & 8307 W Elusive Drive ZA-2007-4127(ZAD) ENV-2007-4128-MND

By a vote of 7 yes, 0 no, and 1 abstention by Michael Kemp, the BABCNC Planning & Land Use Committee recommended to **oppose** the project as presented.

Jamie gave an explanation; the applicant had no access to his property whatsoever; had not obtained easement to access his property; no environmental review in a sensitive area.

Motion: To oppose the project as presented moved by Michael Kemp, none opposed; one abstention by Maureen Levinson; **motion to oppose passed.**

iv. 8461 (8457) Grand View Drive – ZA 2015-718-ZAD-ZAA

By a vote of 6 yes, 2 no from Nickie and Stephen Twining, 0 abstentions, and 1 recusal by Jamie Hall, the BABCNC Planning & Land Use Committee recommended to **approve the project as amended, contingent upon the committee’s review of the MND.**

Jamie Hall stated that he represents the neighborhood on another matter, and recused himself in the interest of caution. Robert Schlesinger gave update, noting that Shane is not prepared.

Stephanie Savage explained that there needs to be an MND, including a comprehensive review of the staging and parking. Road in front of property is 16 feet.

Public Comment:

Jack Ketchian spoke in opposition, citing distance of staging from the project.

Billy Brown lives on GrandView, spoke in opposition, due to traffic and safety, fire hazards, with Airbnb, we’re beyond the saturation point; the City has done nothing.

James Marzullo lives on Crisler Way, cited poor roads in Kirkwood Bowl.

Barbara Chinlund on Yucca Trail, close to Grand View, noted that there is nowhere to park now; it’s basically a one-way street; can’t see how hillside can sustain this.

Brin Gleason, on Nash Drive, cited the long time it takes for an ambulance to arrive in an emergency, an ambulance had to maneuver around construction trucks.

Jason Swing on Grand View Drive, states this is not feasible project for this street. Cited a mudslide the size of three football fields.

Ann Song, from Grand View, direct neighbor, concerned about destruction to her property, already sustained by a project down her street; that there is no opportunity for cars to pass; workers block her cars, impacts her business; safety, and for other personal reasons.

Naureen McMillan is concerned about safety; anticipates that there will be trucks where they shouldn’t be; that minutes count in an emergency.

Tom Kreuzen gave his time to Skip.

Skip Haynes, from the Concerned Citizens of Kirkwood Bowl, showed his map of 8 proposed projects on Grand View that can be approved in next two years; stated that Grand View Drive is #1 risk for fire, because there is no access and there is a wind that starts every day that fed the fire in 1979. He asked if Shane could widen the street all the way to Kirkwood; feels that for 8 projects there needs to be order, to start and stop.

Shane Patel responded that he has been listening and has reached out to a variety of the neighbors. The most narrow point of Grand View is 12.8 feet from Kirkwood to his lot. He has rented a concrete truck to test the staging spot. There will be 35 caissons; he won’t pour on Thursdays; calculates 20 trucks of concrete; one week of pouring.

Travis Longcore asked if he has started the CEQA process, as the ZA won’t hear this until MND is complete. He suggested that the Board not take action until seeing how the environmental review has dealt with the very real concerns; that the process is to put all of our concerns and expert testimony into the record.

Motion: To table moved by Travis Longcore; seconded by Larry Leisten. **Motion passed.** Shane said he'd be happy to do further outreach, come back to the PLUC, the Board and then the ZA. (In addition to Stephanie visiting the site, Nickie noted that she has been to the site.)
