Discussion & Possible Motion: To send CIS to SUPPORT Councilmember Koretz's Resolution introduced on October 21, 2020 and referred to Energy, Climate Change and Environmental Justice Committee, which states with the concurrence of the Mayor, that by adoption of this Resolution, the City of Los Angeles hereby includes in its 2021-2022 State Legislative Program OPPOSITION to SB 9 (Atkins), which if enacted into law would require cities and counties, including charter cities, to provide for the ministerial ('by right) approval of a housing development containing two residential units (a duplex), and a parcel map dividing a lot into two equal parts ('lot split'), for residential use; and exempts environmental review; and would approve these projects without discretionary review, or a public hearing; thereby undermining local land use control and the concept of 'Home Rule' by the imposition of State legislation on local government agencies, including charter cities.

 Discussion and Possible Motion: To send CIS to SUPPORT Councilmember Koretz's & Bonin's Resolution introduced on December 15, 2020, and referred to the Homelessness and Poverty Committee, which asks that the City Administrative Officer (CAO), the Bureau of Engineering (BOE), the Department of Building and Safety and any other relevant departments and agencies be instructed to review the Pallet Shelter tiny home village program and develop alternatives which can bring the per unit cost down to the \$17,000-22,000 range other California communities have been able to utilize the same equipment for in service of the same purpose; and further that strategies such as reduced construction costs, alternative approaches to structural stability and safety, pared-down amenities, permit and fee waivers, and involvement of village residents in maintenance and operational tasks when feasible and appropriate, should be explored, among others, as part of this effort; and further that the CAO and BOE report back to the City Council in 30 days with recommendations for reducing the costs of these tiny home villages so that more Angelenos experiencing homelessness can be provided with shelter.

- Tiny houses are prefab 64-square-foot and composite sheds that are being used as quick and inexpensive emergency shelters for homeless individuals. The City of Los Angeles has plans to open the first tiny-house village in January but cost analysis has revealed a burdensome price tag on the project, approximately \$130,000 per unit while other cities are accomplishing similar size installations at a fraction of the cost (as little as 10% of that paid by L.A.).

CF #20-1045: Land Use Reform / Increasing Transparency / Processes & Procedures Ordinance / Update Discussion and Possible Motion Consider motion by Councilmembers Nury Martinez & Paul Krekorian "Land Use Reform Increasing Transparency" introduced on 08/19/2020 asking that the City Planning Department, in coordination with the Chief Legislative Analyst, update the Processes and Procedures Ordinance with additional criteria on when entitlements such as legislative actions and Conditional Use Permits will be granted and should restrict actions from moving forward unless it can be established that they are in the public interest or otherwise adhere to established policies of the city. Further, that the City Planning Department, in coordination with the Chief Legislative Analyst, establish new protocols around communication between developers and council offices that takes place outside official meetings or hearings; these protocols should ensure that discussions between developers and council offices take place transparently and with appropriate disclosures. - 26. Westside Regional Alliance of Councils (WRAC) (Discussion & Possible Action) Robin Greenberg Report by Representative: WRAC met on Zoom on December 21st & recommended Discussion & Possible Motion to Support: Prioritize School Re-openings:
 - i. Whereas schools provide "essential academic and social-emotional learning" environments, and a broader array of resources including "physical, mental health, and therapeutic services" ¹
 - ii. Whereas "school closures impede learning and compound inequities, disproportionately affecting disadvantaged children" and particularly disadvantaged are students who are at a young age, have special needs, or are from underprivileged households;
 - **iii.** Whereas many states and countries have successfully prioritized the opening of schools over businesses, instead of the other way around;
 - iv. Whereas Federal, State and local governments can offer stipends, grants, and loans to businesses and employees who may be forced to close, however the same government bodies cannot offer redress to students for lost opportunities and benefits derived from education;
 - v. Whereas "safe and consistently open schools are essential for many parents and guardians ... to reenter the workforce" and forcing working parents into full time childcare is neither fair nor sustainable;
 - vi. Whereas the health of all students, staff and teachers must be protected, the federal government and State of California must provide school districts with the resources needed for the safe reopening of schools and to contain outbreaks (should they occur) including the prioritization of school staff and teachers in vaccine distribution;
 - vii. Therefore, the Board supports prioritizing the many efforts needed to safely reopen elementary schools and special-needs classes for the most vulnerable students in Los Angeles including, but not limited to, daily testing, vaccinations for all qualified students and staff, access to personal protective equipment and the necessary training and signed COVID protocol agreements.
